World Epilepsy Day – Tuesday 10th February



Attendance Snippet

How much could I be fined if my child misses school?

How many penalty notices can I get? From the 2024-25 school year, the fine for school absence penalty notices across the country will be £80 if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid within 28 days. If you do not pay the fine you may be prosecuted in court. If a parent receives a second penalty notice for the same child within any three-year period, the charge will be a flat rate of £160; there will be no reduction if paid within 21 days. Penalty notices for absence before the 2024-25 school year do not count. A parent cannot receive more than two penalty notices for the same child within any three-year period. This is because it is clear that previous penalty notices have not worked. Once this limit has been reached, another action like a parenting order or prosecution will be considered. Penalty notices for absence before the 2024-25 school year do not count in this limit.

Class Snippets

Pre-School – this week we have been looking at the Gruffalo story, a very familiar story with the children and they have loved describing the Gruffalo and his features.

The children have had a whale of a time in the Gruffalo crumble sensory tray - complete with carrot 'orange eyes' pea 'poisonous warts' and mini marshmallow 'horrible teeth' - making Gruffalo crumble! They have used lots of lovely mathematical and descriptive language, re telling the story, describing the Gruffalos features and sharing the space and 'ingredients'! They have also created their own Gruffalo face using various methods and materials. The children have really enjoyed looking at our initial letter sounds-SATPIN, where they have initiated adding magnetic letters to our display.



Class 1 – we have continued our learning about the moon this week and we learnt some interesting facts about how the moon has less gravity and no atmosphere, meaning humans cannot breathe on the moon. We have furthered this learning by exploring the first moon landing and connected our thoughts by realising why it was essential for Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin to wear space suits. In phonics reception sound has been 'er' and in maths we revisited the concept of more and fewer.

Class 2 had a brilliant week and amazed me with their fantastic work. In religion and worldviews the children learnt about Rakhi bracelets and the ceremony between siblings. They designed their own bracelets and made them using beads. In music they have been using amazing vocabulary to describe folk music and enjoyed dancing to Lord of the Dance. They are learning to clap to the beat and create their own improvised musical rhythms. In geography we explored countries on the Equator and counties in the Arctic to compare them. The children loved seeing arctic animals and the illuminated waters of Jamaica. Sounds for the week are ear- (air) pear and ear- (er) tear Y1 and kn silent k in knees for Y2s. We celebrated international hijab week by reading lots of stories, designing prayer mats and designing hijabs.

Class 3 have been working incredibly hard this week. In writing, the children have written and edited a set of instructions, focusing on imperative verbs, time adverbials and clear, detailed steps. They are looking forward to *publishing* their work next week. In maths, Year 4 have completed their addition unit and begun exploring formal written methods for subtraction, while Year 3 have started work on column addition. In PE, the children practised passing the baton in relay races, and in RE they explored and compared different Christian denominations. A great penultimate week of the term.

Class 4 have worked hard this week to write their Just So stories - they have had some really creative ideas about their plots and how certain features of animals came to be. In Maths, Y6 have been exploring and consolidating their knowledge about 3D shapes and Year 5 have started their new unit on multiplication and division - they are learning formal methods for both of these operations, including long multiplication and short division. In Geography, they have been exploring the different biomes within South America due to the size of the continent and in Science, they have conducted an investigation into how humans grow at different rates. The children considered the type of graph they would need for this and how they could represent their data. Thank you to the children who represented our school at the Football Tournament; the feedback has been positive and they had a great time.

Parent/Carer Checklist

It would be helpful if Parents/Carers could run through a daily checklist before school, to ensure that your child/ren are ready for the school day. This would reduce the amount of phone calls home the school has to make and also reduce anxieties for your child/ren.
