Breakfast Club and After School Club Bookings

We are finding that our wrap around care clubs are currently quite full on some days. Please could you adhere to protocol to enable the school to continue to be flexible and support parents/carers when they need to access this provision. Current issues are impacting on staffing levels required to maintain our safeguarding ratios. Please could we ask that you:

- Complete a booking form if you know that you require BC or ASC in advance (copies available from reception).
- Contract the school if you require a last minute place at BC or ASC (preferably by phone).
- Cancel your regular or booked place should you no longer require either BC or ASC.
- Neither BC or ASC are drop in sessions, your child's place must be booked. Thank you. (Article 24- access to food and water)

Charging Policy Review

The school has updated and reviewed the Charging Policy to bring both Woodside and Steam Mills Schools in alignment under the Federated Governing Body. This has resulted in a slight increase for some of our services here at Steam Mills which will help towards increased costs for Heating Oil, Electricity, Food and bought in Professional Services etc. We have attached a copy and there is a copy posted on the school website. Here is an overview of the main changes which take effect from 1st April 2023:

Strike action by members of the National Education Union

I am writing to you about forthcoming strike action by the National Education Union (NEU), one of the main teaching trade unions. You will have seen coverage of this in the news, and I wish to inform you about the impact this is likely to have at our school.

There are three national and one regional day strikes planned. The strike days that are may affect schools in this area are:

- ·Thursday 2 March 2023
- ·Wednesday 15 March 2023
- •Thursday 16 March 2023

Clearly this is a difficult situation; I would ask you, however, to be understanding. A national strike by teachers is very unusual. Taking strike action is not something that any teacher would undertake lightly. Those who wish to strike will have thought long and hard about their decision. One of the key issues will be to assess whether there are sufficient staff available for the school to remain open, or partially open, during a strike. We will endeavour to give you as much notice as possible.

How will strike action affect our school?

Pre-school – The children have loved learning about our last wonder – The Bee! They have created hand printed bees and Oreo Bees – which we enjoyed for snack. We have also tasted honey, looked at Beehives and the hexagon.

Class 1 - This week the children have been continuing with their caption writing for Jack and the Beanstalk. They have all been fantastic with their writing, being super independent, sounding out all their own words! This week's sound is 'oa', found in words such as 'goat' and 'toad' and they have been working really hard to identify different 'oa' words. In maths, we have been comparing and measuring height, the children have had lots of fun measuring the height of dinosaurs and dragons.

Class 2 – This term, Class 2 have been swimming and they have all made such a great improvement from where we started 7 weeks ago. They are very sensible in the pool and on the poolside, they try

their best even when it is difficult and I can't wait to see them progress next term as swimming continues. This week, we have been using our geographical skills to understand the terms 'north, south, east and west'. The year 1's used this knowledge to move around the playaround and go in different directions. The year 2's used maps of Australia and compasses to write directions. We also were very lucky to do Now Press Play this week, which also helped with our directional skills. I would also like to say how proud I am of Class 2 and their improvement in maths this term! They have all made such a great leap in their knowledge and understanding of our topics. The year 2's have been looking at multiplication this term and their understanding has amazed me, they have all come into every lesson with a can do attitude!

Class 3 have worked incredibly hard this week. In writing, they have been inspired by Greta and the Giants and a WWF webinar to create their own information leaflets about the problems caused by climate change and how we can help reduce it. In maths, the Y4s have completed their subtraction unit of work and are moving onto formal multiplication and the Y3s have impressed us again this week with work on
